Religious Reformations in Huntingdonshire: Welcome or Tolerated?

Half a millennium after Martin Luther allegedly nailed his theses to a church in Wittenberg, the Reformation continues to be vigorously debated and interpreted. What was the experience of going to church before the reformation changes? Was the Reformation welcomed or merely tolerated by worshippers? How did the Reformation develop into Civil War in the next century, and why were people fixated by the threat posed by witches? How did the Church of England respond to the challenge posed by nonconformity?

The study day focuses on the impact of the 'Long Reformation' upon Huntingdonshire. The speakers are all associated with the University of Cambridge, and are the authors of a new book 'Religious Reformations in Huntingdonshire: Welcome or Tolerated?' based on extensive new research on the topic.
